Facts

Sweden at the turn of the century 1900

The beginning of the 20th century was a period of great change and upheaval in Sweden. Many people left the countryside and the life as farmers, for an industrial job in the city. There were many new technical inventions in the community, such as railways, cars, telephones, electricity etc. Most people believed in the future and thought that almost anything was possible. But there were still big differences between rich and poor, new and old.

Everybody read the news about discoveries, thrilling stories of great explorers and for example life in America, in the local newspaper. Many people emigrated to America (1,2 million Swedes altogether) to build a better future for themselves and their families. They wrote letters back and sent money to their relatives in Sweden. Some even came back after a few years. Others went to Germany to work for a year or two.

Scenario, Södra Bruket, autumn in the year 1900

It is Saturday morning in the early autumn and it's very busy at the Southern factory at Degerhamn. Like all Saturdays work will finish a little bit earlier today.

The inspector gives the duties in the morning. His wife needs new clothing pegs so some of the men will make some. The wife in one of the very poor families has asked her neighbours for help. Some young women will help her with the cleaning and cooking while the men are at work at the factory.

At the same time as working men and women are talking about the current issues. One has heard that a socialist agitator is coming to the factory. The socialist mentions the social injustices there are in society and encourages people to work for change, to form a labour union and maybe even make revolution.

There is also a lot of talking and discussing about democracy and that every man and woman should have equal voting. Some of the women are attracted to the new ideas but others like the old traditional society better.

The foreman of the factory has been to America and say that everything is bigger and better over there. Can we trust him? Many dream of going far away to America, to Australia or even to South Africa and find a new and better life.

A musician is often coming on Saturdays and there will be some dancing. Is he coming today?

Key questions

- How do we find life at the industry? Does the owner use us? What about forming a labour union?
- Democracy and social injustice. How do we change society in a better and more equal way, what is our way of democracy? Socialism? Voting for both men and women?
- How do we want the future to be? For ourselves? For the community? Should we stay or leave? Maybe even emigrate to America? Or to South Africa?
