Achievements

Introduction

Addressing community challenges and supporting educational programmes were implemented with the support received from the community. Although funding was limited, the large core of volunteers, supported by the Board, international, national, provincial and local partnerships was a major motivating factor in continually breaking new grounds.

1. Time Travel and Applied Heritage Programme

Time travel activities and events took place in Ugu and Umzimkhulu District municipalities. Presentation of papers at the international conference held in Finland and seminar in Sweden was a highlight.

Through partnership collaboration with Bridging Ages South Africa members (BASA) and Bridging Ages (international), the programme is making a positive contribution in transforming arts, heritage and culture programmes on a national level.

Impact

- Seven time travel educational programmes were held.
- Commemoration of National Days held, viz Heritage and Human Rights days respectively.

- The piloting of Time Travel and Therapy is ground-breaking work. This is piloted jointly with Inathi Child and Youth Care Facility.
- Supported national and provincial time travel programmes.
- Selected as national trainers to train 5 provinces on Time Travel and Applied heritage methodology. Training held in October.
- Research conducted on Forceful Removals.
- Job opportunities created.

3. Synopsis of Time Travel events

Time Travel Emaus Mission 1904

Goal of the event:

- To learn about local heritage.
- To address community needs
- Confidence and leadership development

Total of 141 participants, made up of learners from Emaus Secondary and Primary Schools.



Time Travel Isivivana King Shaka 1828.

Goals: Introduction of a local heritage site

Local homestead was hired to dress up in traditional attire, store personal belongings and distribute refreshments.

Community members that are themselves the present Induna, sangoma or praise singers were employed for the day to role-play their present-day position in 1828. This site has the potential of being a major tourist attraction.



Betania Mission 1912 Time Travel

Goal

To recognize the school and Mission as a heritage site To develop rural communities heritage sites and recognise their importance.

Support Grade 10 Social Science Curriculum "lifelong learning"

Impact:

- Equal participation
- Exposure to indigenous games, crafts, & food
- Learners and educators felt at ease and expressed positively the variation in learning as compared to a class room setting.



Commemoration of Human Rights Day: Time Travel Gamalakhe Tin Town 1868

Purpose of the event:

To commemorate human rights day

Promote tourism, use of local heritage.

Passing down indigenous knowledge

Persons with skills in crafts, indigenous

knowledge, arts, musician, agriculture, and educators specific to a subject were facilitators.

4. Research

Research is an ongoing process. The recorded information, with permission obtained from the interviewee, is archived, used for publication and developing time travel events. Two interviews are highlighted.

Name: Winnifred Nomfanelo Daki Born: 1932/10/21 to 2018 /4/31

Mrs. Daki was interviewed six months prior to her passing on.

Daki family was the first family in Port Shepstone subjected to the Group Areas Act 1950. They were living comfortably adjacent to the present magistrate's court, Port Shepstone in 1968. Her husband was an employee of the Department of Education. At that period in time, many of the government departments shared space at the magistrate court, Port Shepstone.

Overnight the family was forcefully removed to Gamalakhe Tin Town. They were the first known family subjected to this removal. She described this move as frightening and they were left in despair to fend for themselves. Grassy pathways were roads; the area lacked sanitation and piped water.

Sister Xavier

Born Marianne Gerda Pohl, in Berlin, Germany in 1940, Sister Xavier came to South Africa in 1963 to fulfil what she saw as her life's mission, which was to care for needy children in Africa. In 1982, she established St. Martin's Home, situated in Oribi.

We were fortunate to interview her in June, just three months before she had passed on at the age of 77. Her story of passion for the care of vulnerable children, her religious duties, stand for independent ideas and her care for working with the community is admirable. The legacy of this formidable, determined, caring and dedicated woman lives on.



Her story resulted in developing a time travel activity, piloted in October 2018. It is the first, internationally to embark on "Time Travel and Therapy" The goal is to address children's needs.

5. Props and Site Development

Props per time travel have been researched to depict that specific period in history. Three trained persons maintain, dispatch, receive, and repair props. This is a part-time job opportunity created. Sites are reconstructed for the time travel event. Safety aspects are taken into account. Sites are maintained. Security employed where time travel events are held.

Local Communities are beneficiaries of all our activities. As a principle to support the local initiative, crafts, costumes, and traditional attire are procured from the local community.

6. Catering

A meal is provided to learners at all activities. To ensure that local communities are beneficiaries, community members are recruited and employed as service providers. Meals are traditional and are reflective of the time period of the event. Preparing a meal is an activity itself.

Refreshments are provided before an event



7. Poverty Alleviation and Crises Intervention: Donations received from Lucky's Store, Rice for Life and other donors were handed out to families affected by devastating rain. Distribution was made to Margate and Murchison residence that were most affected. Here, Selvan Chetty and Eunis Moosa are thanked for their support.





8. Community Outreach

Mandela Day 18 June 2017:

Board member Silvy Ragoobar joined the programme to reach out to local hospital. Baby hampers distributed to the Children's Ward at Murchison Hospital was well received.



9. Putting a Smile on Children's Faces

Donations from the goodwill of the community have been distributed to underprivileged children in Umzumbe, Murchison and Gamalakhe.



10. Collaboration and Support

Inathi Child and Youth Care Centre:

December 2017, attended a farewell event at the Centre, where children were recognised for their efforts. It was a day filled with joy and giving.

Further, the Association identified the need to have the Centre curtained. In this respect, our partnership with



Potters House Ministries for raising a percentage of the funds made this possible. Workwell Tailors stitched 57 curtains at no costs. This was well received at the handover ceremony. Time Travel to 1876

Presentation title: Applied Heritage in Building the Future: A creative tool for community building. Abstract below, was delivered by G Khan.

Working together creates the ability to assist with community needs but also lays the basis for more sustained therapeutic interventions"



"The Time Travel at the conference focussed on the year 1917, when the question of how the new democracy would be implemented. Finland celebrated 100 years as an independent state in 2017. As it was in 1917, the question of nationalism, ethnicity and identity was debated. The question of how to create an equal world is as current now as it was then. What does democracy mean? Can it be understood in different ways? What is the role of



history and heritage in this? Can we attempt to use the past in order to make sense of our present circumstances? Based on the conference theme, innovative examples of how to discuss and reflect on democracy, nationalism, identity, ethnicity and unionism through heritage education and the Time Travel method was the key focus." Annina This example informs that democracy was achieved in many countries, at different times.
